KEY TO COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

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| BEG | Beginner. These courses are open to all students, but are designed specifically for new writers. |
| INT | Intermediate. These courses are for students with writing experience and some familiarity with workshops. |
| ALL | All. These courses are for writers of all experience levels—including beginners! |
| PRO | PRO/Advanced. Space may be limited in these courses for students not enrolled in PRO. A manuscript review may also be required for new students. |
| GEN | Generative. These courses focus on creating new work through exercises and prompts. |
| SEM | Seminar. These courses examine literary schools, craft, and/or writing theory in practice; reading is often required. |
| WRK | Workshop. These courses focus on peer critique and/or revision strategies. |
| MS | Multiple Styles. Classes will incorporate multiple instruction styles. |
| DWC | Course will take place in-person at the Downtown Writers Center |
| ONLINE | Course will take place online (e.g. Zoom) |
| HYBRID | Students can join either in-person at the Downtown Writers Center or online. |
| ASYNCH | Students write and share work without a weekly scheduled class. |

SUMMER 2025 CREATIVE WRITING COURSES

POETRY COURSES

WHAT IS YOUR POETICS?

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Thomas Townsley. Mondays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 7. Have you taken time to consider your poetics? What are your thoughts about the nature and function(s) of poetry? We'll read excerpts from various essays on poetics and then share our own ideas.

OLD GODS, NEW VERSE: REIMAGINING ANTIQUITY

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Tim McCoy. Tuesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 8. Explore how poets (Oswald, Carson, etc.) dialogue with antiquity. We'll write our own poems inspired by their approaches and create direct poetic responses to ancient texts.

CONTEMPORARY POETRY AND CRAFT

(ALL - SEM - ONLINE) with Melissa Tuckey. Wednesdays, 4 to 6 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 9. Whether you're working on your own collection of poems, or you just want to read more poetry, this class is for you. We'll read award-winning books by Jericho Brown, Carolyn Forché, Ilya Kaminsky, Diane Seuss, and Lena Khalaf Tuffaha. Weekly writing prompts will be offered.

SHARED VOICES: A COLLABORATIVE WORKSHOP

(ALL - GEN - ONLINE) with Derek Pollard. Thursdays, 6 to 8 PM. 4 weeks, starting July 24. This generative workshop explores how collaboration can help you discover new ways of writing. We'll create new work with our fellow poets and gain practical tools for ongoing collaborations.

JUMP-STARTING YOUR POETRY

(BEG - GEN - ONLINE) with Dan Simpson. Thursdays, 5 to 7 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 10. In this encouraging community, we'll write poems, read wide-ranging work by established writers, and talk all things writing. We'll pay some attention to revision, but our focus will be writing new work.

FICTION COURSES

THE SPECULATIVE FICTION GENERATOR

(ALL - GEN - ONLINE) with Chris DelGuercio. Tuesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 8. Students will complete a short, speculative fiction piece using a variety of creative prompts, brainstorming, and workshopping.

WRITING THE MIDDLE

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Alyssa Pfingst. Saturdays, 1 to 3 PM. 6 weeks, starting August 2. How a story begins and ends are important, but the middle of the story rarely gets the attention it deserves. This course is dedicated to making the middle of your story just as thrilling to keep the reader riveted every step of the way.

NONFICTION COURSES

THE SUMMER FLOW: NONFICTION WORKSHOP

(ALL - WRK - ONLINE) with Georgia Popoff. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 9, and Thursdays, 1 to 3 PM, starting July 10. Our popular workshop continues with weekly comments and critique. New members are welcome, so if you're working on a project or need a group, join us!

HOW TO BE YOUR OWN BEST EDITOR

(BEG - WRK - ONLINE) with Steven Schwankert. Mondays, 7 to 9 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 7. In this class, you'll learn the secrets that every editor wished people knew! We'll talk grammar, style, structure, proofreading, editing tools, and publishing standards.

DRAMATIC WRITING

WHAT'S REALLY IN A SCREENPLAY?

(ALL - SEM - HYBRID) with Casey Baker. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 9. We'll analyze award-winning screenplays to learn the "do's and don'ts" of screenwriting and to identify the hidden "beats" that screenwriters hit in each of their stories.

CROSS-GENRE COURSES

BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO LITERARY TRANSLATION

(INT - MS - ONLINE) with Deb Diemont. Mondays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 7. We'll read essays by renowned writer-translators, including Lydia Davis and Octavio Paz, compare different versions of translated works, and discuss what makes a translation effective. Writers will have the option to translate a poem or story to share.

CAPTURING MOTHERHOOD IN ESSAYS AND POEMS

(INT - GEN - ONLINE) with Ona Gritz. Tuesdays, 5 to 7 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 8. Mothering deepens us as people, and adds poignancy and urgency to our work as writers. In this class, we'll learn to write authentically about motherhood in all its beauty and messy complexity.

STRIKING SATIRES FOR SOCIAL CHANGE

(ALL - GEN - ONLINE) with Suzanne Ondrus. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 9. Flip the script and learn to use humor to critique political and social problems. Explore the form of satire in plays, proposals, poems, and stories.

ADVANCED PROSE WORKSHOP

(PRO - WRK - ONLINE) with Nicholas Rys. Tuesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 8. We will work-shop creative nonfiction or fiction, and there will occasionally be readings if time permits, but the class will primarily be centered on reading and providing feedback on each others' work. WRITING ABOUT LOVE

(ALL - GEN - DWC) with Gemma Cooper-Novack. Thursdays, 5 to 7 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 9. Love is central to all of our favorite works of art. Through generative exercises, discussions, and wild literary adventures, this class will explore the excitement and complexity of writing about love in all of its forms.

FINDING YOURSELF AS A QUEER WRITER

(ALL - WRK - HYBRID) with Gemma Cooper-Novack. Saturdays, 3 to 5 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 12. How can queer writers identify the traditions and present moments to which we belong? We'll read fiction, poetry, and scripts by queer writers, and use them to develop our own understanding, voice, and skills as queer writers. Returning and new students are welcome!

WRITING LONGER WORK

(ALL - MS - DWC) with Gemma Cooper-Novack. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 10. This popular workshop returns! For anyone who has a great idea and wants to take the leap to write something longer. Through exercises and critiques, we will sharpen our skills for going the distance. We welcome new members, and you don't need to have started your book to take this class. Just bring your ideas and commitment!

INTRODUCTION TO GRANTWRITING

(ALL - MS - ONLINE) w/ Tory Russo. Wednesdays, 6 to 8 PM. 6 weeks, starting July 9. This course provides an overview of how grants are made, finding opportunities and funders, and writing grants. Writers will develop a grant template for current or future opportunities. This course is for both individuals or organizations.

CASEY BAKER has been working as a screenwriter and independent film producer for 10 years covering multiple genres for both feature films and short films.
